**Guest Speaker Biography** 

Steven F. Firks Captain, USN (Ret)

Steven Firks was born in Crawfordsville, Indiana, attended Mollie E. Ray Elementary School in Pine Hills, Florida, and Hazelwood Junior and Senior High Schools in Florissant Missouri, graduating in 1970. He then attended the U.S. Naval Academy, graduating in June 1974.

Following graduation from the Naval Academy, Steve attended flight training, and was assigned to fly the A-7E Corsair II. deploying to the Western Pacific and Indian Ocean with the VA-146 Blue Diamonds in USS Constellation (CV-64). CVW-2 in USS Ranger (CV-61) and VA-97 Warhawks in USS Carl Vinson (CVN-70). Following a tour in Fallon, Nevada flying the F-5E Tiger II and A-4F Skyhawk as an adversary pilot, he transitioned to the F/A-18 Hornet and made combat deployments for Operations Desert Storm and Southern Watch with the VFA-195 Dambusters aboard USS Midway (CV-41) and USS Independence (CV-62), including 32 combat missions into Iraq and Kuwait in support of Operation Desert Storm. He then attended U.S. Navy Nuclear Power School and in 1995 was assigned as the Executive Officer in USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN-71), supporting combat operations in Bosnia. He commanded USS Seattle (AOE-3) from 1996 to 1998, deploying to the Arabian Gulf with the USS George Washington Battle Group. Following a short assignment as the Joint Operations Officer on Commander Second Fleet staff, Steve commanded the nuclear aircraft carrier USS Nimitz (CVN-68) from 1999 to 2002, leading the crew through the first nuclear refueling of a Nimitz class aircraft carrier, and homeport change from Newport News, Virginia to San Diego, California. His last assignment in the Navy was in Colorado Springs, Colorado where he served as the Vice Director of Plans in U.S. Space Command and as the first Division Chief for Ballistic Missile Defense in U.S. Northern Command. CAPT Firks joined the Missile Defense Agency in July 2004 after 30 years' service in the United States Navy. Steve established the Ballistic Missile Defense System Watch Officer (BWO) team, which has grown to become a vital source of information for MDA Senior Leadership, and a centerpiece of MDA's around the clock support to Warfighters who defend the nation from ballistic missile attack. He currently leads Warfighter Strategic Integration - Colorado Springs, with responsibilities for the MDA Operations Support Center, BMDS Asset Management, Operational Readiness Reporting and BMDS Strategic Planning support.

Steve earned a Bachelor's Degree in General Engineering from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1974, a Master's Degree in Aeronautical Engineering from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School in 1986 and he earned nuclear operator and supervisory qualifications in U.S. Navy Nuclear Power School in 1994. His Military Awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit (two Awards), the Meritorious Service Medal (two Awards), the Air Medal (one Award for Valor, two Meritorious), the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (one Award for Valor, two Meritorious), as well as other command and unit awards. Steve was the third recipient of the annually awarded Missile Defense Agency Star Award in May, 2007. He is married to the former Susan Taylor of Florissant, Missouri. They have been blessed with three children, Catherine, Jeffrey and Timothy, and six grandchildren, Kristen, Allison, Owen, Benjamin, Kaylee and Lauren.

#### Letter from Earl Boutell

Freida and I drove from KC to Detroit (Marine City) on June 21 to visit with Tom and Terry Filo. John and Marian Cardillo had been to visit them 2 weeks earlier. Jim and Helene Dolente are scheduled to see them in less than 2 weeks. Around Christmas of 2014 Tom was diagnosed with ALS. As you may already know, Lou Gehrig's disease is always fatal. Some can live up to 10 years with it; others, like Tom, will live less than a year after diagnosis.

ALS results in nerves that are killed off that control voluntary muscles thru a chemical released by the brain. The arm and leg muscles are usually first to go, eventually the tongue and throat muscles die and the victim chokes to death. This process is irreversible. Tom lost use of his legs and left arm and hand, and his right arm. His voice is quite weak, especially towards the end of the day, so he has an amplifier that fits like a headset w/ mike. The thing that hasn't changed with Tom is his intelligence and especially his sense of humor. As a gift he received a new Navy blue camo hat, so one day and I told him several times not to take the hat off and turn around, that I'd get it. We laughed about it, and Tom said he'd "will it" to me.

Terry has to do EVERYTHING for Tom. This includes feeding, bathing, dressing, moving him, adjusting his chair, putting him to bed, brushing his teeth, changing catheters... fortunately there is plenty of help from Tom's family- a brother and sister and son and daughter. Tom's brother, John, was there from Alaska when we were there, their sister was to come stay with them around July 1<sup>st</sup>. Friends have stepped up to help, too. And lots of VETERANS! They call it, "Veterans helping Veterans." One is mowing their yard for \$5 a week. Another built a beautiful wheelchair ramp for the cost of materials. A wheelchair elevator was installed at the end of the front porch, allowing Tom to be lowered to the sidewalk and to their van. Someone remodeled the bathroom with a raised toilet, roll in shower, and sink with handicapped 'roll under' vanity.

Two organizations have stepped up to help. One is <u>ALS of Michigan</u>, or the 'ALS Closet' as Terry calls it. Come in and pick out what you need... steel ramps, special dinner plates, wheelchairs, transfer chairs, lifts, voice amplifiers, special chairs, chair elevators... all at no cost. Items are "on loan".

And the second one is <u>Veterans Affairs</u> (VA). They immediately rated Tom at 100% disabled, and gave Tom \$14,000 towards a van. Once Terry picked one out, the VA paid for ALL wheelchair accessible conversions. The VA paid for making the house ADA compliant, like ramps, handles and grip bars, special toilet assist bars, lift chair...

The Filo's are in good shape with all the help they have. Personally, Tom has accepted that he has a short time to live. Doctors speculate a maximum of 90 days, realistically 60 days. Tom said to me, "I've seen my friends, now I'm ready.' All of the final arrangements are made, including Military Honors graveside. He considers every day a gift.

Although Terry has enough help for "her time", she has yet to accept Tom's certain immediate passing. "I just can't get my head around this." is how she explained it to me our last day with them. She works her ass off, all as an act of love. The hardest thing for her is moving Tom in and out of bed, and into and out of his lift chair in the family room. They have a set process for these, and with family help is fairly easy. Tom spends most of his day in his comfortable lift chair that adjusts, and watches TV. With company there, he gets outside more often. He has doctor appointments and up until recently had physical therapy. Both go to an ALS support group.

Editor's note: Our president (Bill Norris) is planning an "Ice Bucket Challenge" with the hopes that everyone who attends will participate. I'm sure that Bill is sending emails out and will inform everyone about the challenge.

#### SHOW and TELL GUEST SPEAKER

**Terry Buckler** was an Army Green Beret and volunteered to participate in what is now known as the Son Tay Raid. Terry has agreed to come and be our guest during the Show & Tell on Thursday during the reunion.

### Son Tay Raid

Son Tay is a village 23 miles west of Hanoi. Our Intel indicated 61 American POWs being held there in a POW camp by the North Viet Namese in 1970. A plan came together to recover our POWs in May. Fifty six Army Special Forces trained at Elgin AFB in Florida at a replica of the POW camp built for them.

They trained for 5 months and on November 21, 1970, the raid was a go. All together there were the 56 Green Beret, 92 airmen and 28 various aircraft involved.

By chance, the North Viet Namese had moved the American POWs just a few days before our Special Forces arrived. There were enemy guards still at the POW camp and 42 of those became casualties while there were only 2 injuries for the Raiders. This RAID sent a message to the NVA, and boosted moral of other POWs.

We look forward to Terry visiting with us and sharing his stories.
