


Review the following pages for information about what you'll be seeing at the reunion, the schedule of events and pricing for the different tours and reunion meals, etc.



# CITY OF SAN DIEGO ---- Some History



The original inhabitants of the region are now known as the <u>San Dieguito</u> and <u>La Jolla people</u>. The area of San Diego has been inhabited for more than 10,000 years by the <u>Kumeyaay people</u>.<sup>[6][7]</sup> The first European to visit the region was <u>Portuguese-born</u> explorer <u>Juan Rodríguez Cabrillo</u> sailing under the flag of <u>Castile</u>. Sailing his flagship *San Salvador* from <u>Navidad</u>, New Spain, Cabrillo claimed the bay for the <u>Spanish Empire</u> in 1542 and named the site 'San Miguel'.<sup>[8]</sup> In November 1602, <u>Sebastián Vizcaíno</u> was sent to map the California coast. Arriving on his flagship *San Diego*, Vizcaíno surveyed the harbor and what are now <u>Mission Bay</u> and <u>Point</u> <u>Loma</u> and named the area for the Catholic <u>Saint Didacus</u>, a Spaniard more commonly known as *San Diego de Alcalá*. On November 12, 1602, the first Christian religious service of record in <u>Alta California</u> was conducted by Friar Antonio de la Ascensión, a member of Vizcaíno's expedition, to celebrate the feast day of San Diego.

In May 1769, <u>Gaspar de Portolà</u> established the Fort Presidio of San Diego on a hill near the <u>San Diego River</u>. In July of the same year, <u>Mission San Diego de Alcalá</u> was founded by <u>Franciscan</u> friars under Father <u>Junípero</u> <u>Serra</u>. By 1797, the mission boasted the largest native population in Alta California, with over 1,400 neophytes living in and around the mission proper. Mission San Diego was the southern anchor in California of the historic mission trail <u>El Camino Real</u>. Both the Presidio and the Mission are <u>National Historic Landmarks</u>.

In 1821, <u>Mexico</u> won its independence from Spain, and San Diego became part of the Mexican state of Alta California. The fort on Presidio Hill was gradually abandoned, while the town of San Diego grew up on the level land below Presidio Hill. The Mission was secularized by the Mexican government, and most of the Mission lands were distributed to wealthy <u>Californio</u> settlers.

As a result of the <u>Mexican-American War</u> of 1846–1848, the territory of Alta California, including San Diego, was ceded to the United States by Mexico. The <u>Battle of San Pasqual</u>, a battle of the Mexican-American War, was fought in 1846 in the <u>San Pasqual Valley</u> which is now part of the city of San Diego. The state of California was admitted to the United States in 1850. That same year San Diego was designated the seat of the newly established San Diego County and was incorporated as a city. The initial city charter was established in 1889 and today's city charter was adopted in 1931.

The original town of San Diego was located at the foot of Presidio Hill, in the area which is now <u>Old Town San</u> <u>Diego State Historic Park</u>. The location was not ideal, being several miles away from navigable water. In the late 1860s, <u>Alonzo Horton</u> promoted a move to "New Town", several miles south of the original settlement, in the area which became <u>Downtown San Diego</u>. People and businesses flocked to New Town because of its location on <u>San Diego Bay</u> convenient to shipping. New Town quickly eclipsed the original settlement, known to this day as <u>Old Town</u>, and became the economic and governmental heart of the city.

### CITY OF SAN DIEGO ---- History (continued)



In the early part of the 20th century, San Diego hosted two <u>World's Fairs</u>: the <u>Panama-California Exposition</u> in 1915 and the <u>California Pacific International Exposition</u> in 1935. Both expositions were held in <u>Balboa Park</u>, and many of the Spanish/Baroque-style buildings that were built for those expositions remain to this day as central features of the park. The buildings were intended to be temporary structures, but most remained in continuous use until they progressively fell into disrepair. Most were eventually rebuilt, using castings of the original facades to retain the architectural style. The menagerie of exotic animals featured at the 1915 exposition provided the basis for the <u>San Diego Zoo</u>.

The southern portion of the <u>Point Loma</u> peninsula was set aside for military purposes as early as 1852. Over the next several decades the <u>Army</u> set up a series of coastal artillery batteries and named the area <u>Fort Rosecrans</u>. Significant U.S. Navy presence began in 1901 with the establishment of the Navy Coaling Station in Point Loma, and expanded greatly during the 1920s. By 1930 the city was host to <u>Naval Base San Diego</u>, <u>Naval Training Center San Diego</u>, <u>San Diego Naval Hospital</u>, <u>Camp Matthews</u>, and <u>Camp Kearny</u> (now <u>Marine Corps Air Station Miramar</u>). The city was also an early center for aviation: as early as World War I San Diego was proclaiming itself "The Air Capital of the West." The city was home to important airplane developers and manufacturers like Ryan Airlines (later <u>Ryan Aeronautical</u>), founded in 1925, and <u>Consolidated Aircraft</u> (later <u>Convair</u>), founded in 1923. <u>Charles A. Lindbergh</u>'s plane <u>The Spirit of St. Louis</u> was built in San Diego in 1927 by Ryan Airlines.

During <u>World War II</u>, San Diego became a major hub of military and defense activity, due to the presence of so many military installations and defense manufacturers. The city's population grew rapidly during and after World War II, more than doubling between 1930 (147,995) and 1950 (333,865). After World War II, the military continued to play a major role in the local economy, but post-<u>Cold War</u> cutbacks took a heavy toll on the local defense and aerospace industries. The resulting downturn led San Diego leaders to seek to diversify the city's economy by focusing on research and science, as well as tourism.

From the start of the 20th century through the 1970s, the American <u>tuna</u> fishing fleet and tuna canning industry were based in San Diego, "the tuna capital of the world". San Diego's first tuna cannery was founded in 1911, and by the mid-1930s the canneries employed more than 1,000 people. Due to rising costs and foreign competition, the last of the canneries closed in the early 1980s. A large fishing fleet supported the canneries, mostly staffed by immigrant fishermen from Japan, and later from the <u>Portuguese Azores</u> and <u>Italy</u> whose influence is still felt in neighborhoods like <u>Little Italy</u> and <u>Point Loma</u>.<sup>[25][26]</sup> In 1950, the Census Bureau reported San Diego's population as 94.5% white and 4.5% black.

Downtown San Diego was in decline in the 1960s and 1970s but experienced some urban renewal since the early 1980s, including the opening of <u>Horton Plaza</u>, the revival of the <u>Gaslamp Quarter</u>, and the construction of the <u>San Diego Convention Center</u>; <u>Petco Park</u> opened in 2004.



The restored Vietnam Riverboats at the Vietnam Unit Memorial Monument (VUMM) that we will visit Friday morning, first stop of the City Tour at 0900. Coronado is the base is where the Navy SEALS train, and where modern riverine warfare is taught.

In 1969, the San Diego Padres joined the ranks of <u>Major League Baseball</u> as one of four new expansion teams, along with the <u>Montreal Expos</u> (now the <u>Washington Nationals</u>), the <u>Kansas City</u> <u>Royals</u> and the <u>Seattle Pilots</u> (now the <u>Milwaukee Brewers</u>). Their original owner was <u>C. Arnholt</u> <u>Smith</u>, a prominent San Diego businessman and former owner of the PCL Padres whose interests included banking, tuna fishing, hotels, real estate and an airline. Despite initial excitement, the guidance of longtime baseball executives, Eddie Leishman and <u>Buzzie Bavasi</u> as well as a new <u>playing field</u>, the team struggled; the Padres finished in last place in each of its first six seasons in the <u>NL West</u>, losing 100 games or more four times. One of the few bright spots on the team during the early years was first baseman and slugger <u>Nate Colbert</u>, an expansion draftee from the <u>Houston</u> <u>Astros and still the Padres' career leader in home runs</u>.

The team's fortunes gradually improved as they won 5 <u>National League West</u> titles and reached the <u>World Series</u> twice, in <u>1984</u> and in <u>1998</u> but lost both times. The Padres main draw during the 80s and 90s was <u>Tony Gwynn</u>, who won a number of league batting titles. They moved into their current stadium Petco Park in 2004.

#### A NOTE FROM VIC:

### SAN DIEGO ZOO

Located in Balboa Park, housing 3700 animals representing the largest zoo in the world. It is privately owned by the nonprofit Zoological Society of San Diego. It opened October 2nd. 1916 by Dr. Wegeforth after it became abandoned in 1915 by the Panama-California Exposition. It went thru many changes of management and appearance thru the decades. There are both cageless exhibits and caged/housed exhibits. In 1975 the first center for research and reproduction was established and has undergone marvelous expansion up thru 2009. September 1997 the first facility to house koalas was built and as of today San Diego Zoo is second to Australia in the number of koalas maintained.

There are guided tours whereby you can ride and see all areas with your tour guide, or you can take the pleasant walk thru at your leisure. There are lunch places, a fun gift shop, beautiful landscapes, and a thrilling aerial view which can be taken in the Skyfari gondola lift. Now, who wouldn't want to enjoy all this while in San Diego.

We will be picked up by bus at the front of our hotel, Town & Country. Be ready to board at 845am on Wednesday....and we will be returned around 3pm.

EXHIBITS: Monkey trails and forest tales; Owens Rain Forest Aviary contains 200 tropical birds. (45 species); Scripps Aviary is where you will view the colorful birds; Panda Trek - houses the giant pandas; Polar Bear Plunge houses 30 species of the Artic; Ituri Forest - from the giant giraffe to the buffalo to the hippos to the many foul of that region.

Elephant Odyssey - here you will not only see 5 elephants, but other wild - lions, jaguars, tapirs, to a secretary bird and the desert tarantula.

Gorilla Tropics is something to see. The rainforests of central Africa - not just the animals but eestful waterfalls and beautiful African tulip trees. Bonobos (pygmy chimps)....this is a breeding ground...

Sun Bear Forest displays Malyan Sun Bears and the silvery Lutung Monkeys. Here you will also see Bluebirds and Fruit Doves.

Tiger River located in a sloping canyon houses Malayan tigers. Outback....yes, the Australian Outback....where you will view koalas, wombats and wallabies...check out the Tasmanian Devils....
