RECAP of the 8th REUNION OF USS SEATTLE (AOE-3) WASHINGTON, DC. 2016

The 8th reunion was an outstanding success. It was our largest attendance! There were 50 Seattle sailors and 48 family and friends, for a total of 98. We have steadily grown each year since 2009, when we had 20 in attendance. This growth speaks to the fact that if someone comes once, they want to come back again. For those who were unable to make it we missed you, but here is a recap of our events!

Wednesday: Arrival

The Hospitality room welcomed all as they arrived. Old Cruise books appeared and the stories started flowing. Pizza was served and lights out was well after midnight.

Thursday: Meetings, Bus Trips and Dinner

Sailors met for a time of story sharing. It was an open floor and we heard stories from all 5 decades Seattle was in service. Some brought memorabilia to pass around.

In our business meeting, David Holton was voted President, replacing Bill Norris, whose term expired. Rich Toma was voted Vice President, replacing Holton. The membership voted to go to San Francisco next year at about the same time frame as this year's event.



Over 90 people got on two busses to go to Arlington National Cemetery for the Changing of the Guard. We had the special honor to lay a wreath at the tomb in a full ceremony with the Guard. It was an outstanding, sunny day and everyone felt a special pride to see the beautiful wreath with USS SEATTLE (AOE-3) ribbon on display in front of the tomb and the landscape of DC in the background. A 2 ½ hour guided, private tram tour of Arlington followed. Next was a bus tour around DC to see some of the monuments, stopping at the Marine, Air force and Navy monuments. On to dinner at a family style Italian restaurant where NO ONE left hungry! A night tour of the lighted monuments followed. Even though it was a long day, the Hospitality room stayed open late again!


Friday: White House & Congress



An early morning bus ride took us to the White House. Security was very tight (wished our country's borders were managed as well—writer's personal comment!). Lunch was at the Congressional cafeteria, then a guided tour of Congress. Because of major renovations going on for the past few years, the tour was shortened, but still amazing to see and “feel” the history of our country. Back to the hotel and after dinner, our guest speaker was Francis Gary Powers, Jr. His father was a U-2 pilot. For those under 50, he was a CIA pilot for the U-2 spy plane, not the pilot for Bono's Irish rock band U-2. Gary told about his father's job, being shot down and his difficult escape at 70,000 feet. We learned about his capture, torture and the prisoner exchange that led to his coming home. The movie, *Bridge of Spies*, with Tom Hanks, is his story. By now you should not be surprised that the Hospitality room was opened!

Saturday: The Navy Yard and the Air & Space Museum

The Navy Yard is a historic place and on site is a museum of Naval ship history with lots to see and learn.



You could actually sit on and move the mounts of WWII ships to have a firsthand experience. The Air & Space Museum is part of the Smithsonian and houses hundreds of planes covering private, commercial and military. Highlights to see are US war planes from every generation, Discovery, spy planes, the Concorde, helicopters and much more.

One of the hall marks of our association is our Saturday night dinner and featured speaker. It begins with the sailors meeting in a room where the senior officer pours a cognac toast to our fallen shipmates. We then formally open with a Color Guard. Sometimes they are ROTC or from the American Legion. This year, being in DC, we filled out DD forms (yes they still exist) and requested the Color Guard and singer.



When the Color Guard exited, Admiral Mazach, our guest speaker asked, “How did you get that Color Guard to come here?” Turns out they were the President's Own!!! And the singer, a Chief Petty Officer with over 20 years, performs regularly at the White House. Next we honored the Missing Service members with an explanation of the table set in their honor. That was followed by the reading of names and bell ringing for the ___ Seattle men and women whom we know have died. Our speaker was retired Admiral John Mazach, the 12th CO of USS Seattle. He entertained us with his memories as Captain and some “Flag stories” most of us would never have been privy to hear or know. With no room for storage, the Supply folks opened the Hospitality room to dispense with the remaining liquid cargo!
